Minutes of June 16, 2026 - 6:00 p.m.

Tina Swinehart, Chairperson, called the meeting of June 16, 2026, to order.

Approval of Minutes:

C. Laughlin MOVED; T. Swinehart seconded to approve the May 19, 2026, Vermillion Parks & Recreation Board Minutes. Roll Call Vote 4 YEAS; 1 ABSTAIN (Kuhn). MOTION CARRIED.

- Donna Costello – Vermilion Community Band Concert – Event Date: September 6, 2026, from 1pm – 4pm @ Main Street Beach & Park Lighthouse

Donna Costello said she is asking to use the Lighthouse area on September 6th to put on a concert. One of their members is in a boat group and they had a concert for them last year down by Water Works and there wasn't enough room there, so they thought the Lighthouse would be a better location. It is a pop-up concert from 1pm-4pm which will give them time to set up. The concert will begin at 2pm and they will be done by 3:30pm and out by 4pm. She checked, and there are no Lighthouse concerts in August but even if they do want to have one on that day, they will be long gone by the time it would start. They will not have a rain date because they are a group of boaters and if it rains, they will not be here on another day.

M. Musial MOVED; J. Beatty seconded to approve the use of the Lighthouse at Main Street Beach and Park for the Vermilion Community Band Concert on the date and time as presented. Roll Call Vote 5 YEAS. MOTION CARRIED.

- Janelle Smith – Pickleball Tournament Fundraiser for Vermilion High School Football – Event Date: July 11, 2026 from 7:30 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. @ West Breeze Park

Janelle Smith said they are looking to hold a Pickleball Tournament at West Breeze Park for the Vermilion Football Team. They are aiming for a max of 50 teams, which would be 100 people with pool-style play. They would start set-up at 7:30am with games beginning at 9am. She does not think they will go all the way until 8pm but would like to reserve it for that time just in case. All proceeds would benefit the Vermilion Football Team. T. Swinehart asked if the rain date would be July 25th. J. Smith answered yes. T. Swinehart asked if they had considered the parking lot and if she thought everything would fit. J. Smith answered yes, it has a decent-sized parking lot, and she can't imagine they would need more than that. She asked if they could reach out to a food truck to come and provide refreshments for the players. Otherwise, they would have water and grill hot dogs for food. M. Weisenberger stated that the food truck would need a generator because there is no electricity or water there. M. Wood said she will want to make sure the food truck is registered with the Building Department. C. Laughlin asked if the tournament would be open to everyone. J. Smith answered yes, it will be open to the public, if approved they will start advertising on social media and in businesses throughout town. They will have a QR code with the registration with a liability form that will need to be signed. T. Swinehart asked if it was a part of Boosters. J. Smith answered yes, they operate under the Booster Club, and they have liability insurance as well. M. Weisenberger said to make sure Jody Booker gets a copy of the liability insurance.

J. Beatty MOVED; S. Kuhn seconded to approve the use of West Breeze Park for the Pickleball Tournament Fundraiser on the dates and times as presented. Roll Call Vote 5 YEAS. **MOTION CARRIED**.

- Jessica Dufner – Archeology Digs – Event Date: July 19, 2026, from 12:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. @ Showse Park

Jessica Dufner said the Archeology Digs program will be on July 19th and there will be two separate sections each for 30 kids. They will have an archeologist that will come in and do all the programming, and he will bring old pots that the kids can put back together. The Library Foundation raised \$100,000 this past year and so now they are doing outreach events at different parks and community buildings. T. Swinehart asked if she was expecting 100 people. J. Dufner answered they will have 60 kids total; 30 in each session and then their parents. If it rains, they will call the attendees and do it at the Library. T. Swinehart asked the intended age group. J. Dufner answered 6-12 years.

C. Laughlin MOVED; J. Beatty seconded to approve the use of Showse Park for Archeology Digs on the date and time as presented. Roll Call Vote 5 YEAS. **MOTION CARRIED**.

- Jessica Dufner – Kite Making – Event Date: August 15, 2026, from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. @ Showse Park

Jessica Dufner said on August 15th they would like to have the Ohio Elevation of Kites Society come to help kids build their own kites. They purchased 50 different kite kits and after building them, hopefully they will get to fly them at Showse Park. If it is a rain date, they will move the location to the Library.

T. Swinehart MOVED; J. Beatty seconded to approve the use of Showse Park for Kite Making on the date and time as presented. Roll Call Vote 5 YEAS. **MOTION CARRIED**.

Recreation Director's Report:

C. Kuhns reported that the rec baseball season began the season on May 26th and they are working through the weather trying to get all the games in since the fields have been wet from all the downpours. T. Swinehart asked when the end of the season is. C. Kuhns answered the regular season ends around the 4th of July and then they will begin tournaments so they should be done mid-July.

Service Director's Report: No Report.

Parks Operation Manager Report:

M. Weisenberger said he would like to congratulate Melissa Price and her Erie Metroparks staff. Today, they had the ribbon cutting at Main Street Beach for their portion of the overall project which was the Wakefield Metropark, and it was a nice ceremony, and he wanted to mention that they did a really nice job. If you haven't walked all the way down Main Street Beach, they added a stone trail which extends off of our concrete sidewalk at the comfort station and goes all the way to the river with a nice loop and some nice seating. They planted some different natural grasses, and it is a big improvement down there. When he spoke to some of the neighbors, they said that they have seen an improvement having a trail that people can follow rather than just making their own path and people are not getting onto the private property quite as much as they have in the past and everyone seems pleased with that improvement.

He thanked Tim Costello who did a great job of coordinating repairs inside the Lighthouse. They had to replace some electric and the fixture and bulb that lights up the Lighthouse. At the same time, they did some painting to take care of some of the rust issues they were starting to notice. They completed the project yesterday and Tim did a good job as always keeping an eye on the Lighthouse and making sure the work all got done.

M. Weisenberger stated that when they apply for grants they have to follow those up with final reports in order to get the funding reimbursed. They just finished three of them. The first is \$85,000 from the Erie County Commissioners Community Development Grant that they got for the new restrooms at Sherod. The restrooms are in and have been up and running and the paperwork has all been turned in so they will be getting a check for \$85,000 from them any day now. The Shores and Islands Destination Grant and the Erie Metroparks Local Grants were used as partial funding for the new beach groomer that they purchased and that paperwork has all been turned in as well. The final donation for the splash pad has been completed. All four of those added up is \$157,000 worth of grants they will be getting reimbursed for.

There is another county grant very similar to the one they used for the restrooms which is a combination of economic development money and tourism money up to \$100,000 that they are going to apply for, and they would like to utilize those funds to do some paving of the parking lots at Sherod Park. It is an Erie County grant, so it has to be used in an Erie County Park. They would use that to repave the repave the upper northwest lot and the main lot that everyone goes to for the scenic overview. They would also like to apply for an ODNR NatureWorks grant which would be up to \$70,355, which could be used for the south parking lot at Sherod Park. With those two grants they would be able to do all the parking lots on the west side of Sherod Park.

T. Swinehart thanked M. Weisenberger for all the work on getting the grants and reports completed.

Budget/Finance Subcommittee Report:

S. Kuhn reported that they met prior to the meeting tonight to discuss current finances and upcoming grants that are out there. It looks like they are in a good financial position which makes everyone very happy for the parks. They will be discussing some needed approvals under New Business.

Showse Park Revitalization & Transformation Project:

Jeff Lucas reported the biggest update was on June 10th there was a Press Release from Kellie Deeter State Representative from District 54 indicating they were awarded a \$150,000 grant to be used for the Showse Park Phase 3 Sports Complex. If you have seen the listing, it was about the third highest amount of money that was awarded to any project over 88 counties. Everyone got a little piece, but Showse Park got a nice piece. He complimented Kellie Deeter who was the driving force and sponsor. Senator Manning did the legwork when it was time for the vote. M. Weisenberger said one of the things that really helped with that is the community involvement and the amount of publicity it has got over the past few years. J. Lucas said there were no less than eight letters from different people including previous Mayors and Directors in Lorain County such as the Economic Development Director and Marty Gallagher Lorain County Commissioner. When the submission packet went in, they had a good group of people which stated this was a great initiative. It exceeded their expectations and they couldn't be more excited because it leads to the Sports Complex and he believes this evening there will be a motion for it to be put to bid. They have done a lot of work on the backend getting estimates from multiple companies so they can know how much they need to even ask for. This will be for the Sports Complex; the existing pad will be restored, revitalizing the fence posts, lowering the institutionalized fence down, interior fencing will be removed and replaced by pickleball fencing in between each of the four pickleball courts and a laying of two surfaces for cornhole. On the other side will be half-court basketball along with some exercise areas. They have also received multiple quotes for the east and west lot to get a ballpark figure of what it will cost to fix these. One is in tragic shape and the other is in good shape but along the way they found out there were some problems with the drainage; they found there were some storm drains that were collapsed which are being worked on now and should be done in a week or two.

M. Weisenberger said the Phase 2 Playground is nearing completion. J. Lucas said he can't speak on behalf of PAV but there is hope that the functional art right be right around the corner, but they need to grow some grass in the interim. They have the sandstone that is going to go around the memorial plaza which was donated again by the Cleveland Stone Company so there will be seating all around the memorial.

J. Lucas stated that the estimates they received for all the work will be covered by the capital budget fund plus some money they had in reserve plus a little extra, but the donation exceeds the City contribution.

M. Musial said he had two playground testers there (his grandkids) and they said it is now their favorite park. J. Lucas said when he is at the park, he will ask the kids what they enjoy and they like the colors and openness and the whole weirdness of the playground; it is not standard, it is unique. The same color scheme will be the color scheme of the pickleball and basketball courts which is sky blue, orange, white lines with a little bit of gray and it will give it a really unique look.

J. Lucas said Friday, June 26th is the first movie night at Showse Park at which the Lorain County Bureau of Tourism and Convention will attend. They are the group that donated all the money for the tiki-huts based on a walk. They walked them around the park and told them what was going to be there and showed them pictures. They were 100% paid for; they were counting on one tiki-hut and were told they would do two tiki-huts. They will have a dedication for the tiki-huts prior to the movie night. It will be a picture night because Gary Gibbs

who was the director, is going to contact a lot of folks. M. Weisenberger said one of the tiki-huts is a Tiki Beach theme and the second one is of the six Indian Tribes that spell out Showse. J. Lucas said Gary Gibbs is also developing the signage by which he has investigated the six Native American Tribes and it will be on a bronzed sign in between the two tiki-huts which will not cost the City a penny.

M. Weisenberger said speaking of Lorain County, they were a big help with the clean-up days, and they provided bags and gloves and things like that. Through those conversations they came across a dozen benches that fold up into a table, and they donated those and they are using them at the splash pad so he would like to thank them for that as well.

J. Beatty said he would like to compliment J. Lucas and the groups that have worked at Showse Park. He drives by the park two or three times a day and there are always kids there. For the past seven years when he drove by it every day, there were not kids there. He saw someone walking from five blocks away pushing a baby carriage to come down there. The groups are very passionate about helping, he knows they even had the football team out there working. He knows it is Jeff's passion and it is that passion to do something different and the dream and vision he had is incredible because it is a crown jewel now. Once they put in the pickleball courts, they really can have a big tournament because it is kind of like soccer fields where they move from one to the next. J. Lucas said it was a shared vision and the vision doesn't stop; they are looking at the ball fields, and they want to get those conditioned as well. J. Beatty thanked M. Weisenberger as well because the more he has talked to him about the different things he is doing; his knowledge and efforts are unbelievable.

T. Swinehart asked J. Lucas if he decided what he was going to do with the one piece at the park that didn't make it – will he be replacing it? J. Lucas answered yes, he worked with Chief Holmes to find out what happened with the piece of equipment that came down. Thanks to the technology of the cameras, he went through and found it and at first, it looked like someone who was hanging on it that might have been a little too old for it but that wasn't it. He went back further and found there were a whole bunch of kids that were on it but that should not have collapsed it so they are going to submit it to the company and talk to them about the warranty to see if that should have happened. When he looks at the breakage, it doesn't look like what you think would happen. He doesn't believe that is an appropriate piece of equipment now based on the inability to have the right people on it so they will get something a little more durable that they can't break no matter how old they are. J. Beatty said it doesn't seem malicious at all, it was by use which they want to have happened. J. Lucas said yes, you can have 15 people on that spinner cone, and they have been on it with no worries, but that piece had an issue, so the lesson learned is to get the most durable because our folks like to play.

T. Swinehart said she would like to add that her grandkids also enjoyed playing at the playground during the Library program. They were there and it was so busy and there were so many families enjoying the park and it was very satisfying. She thanked J. Lucas because he has been the driver of the bus on all that and it is satisfying to sit and look and see how far they have come and it is being appreciated and enjoyed. J. Lucas said it is interesting when you are walking around there and see different people with their kids and you see all the cars and see it is the east meeting the west; there were people from both sides which is what they wanted.

Recreation and School Relations: No Report.

Vermilion Community Pool Subcommittee:

T. Swinehart reported that swimming lessons are in their second week and they have partnered with the Vermilion High School Swim Team who are helping to teach those lessons, which have been very well received.

They will be finishing this Friday and then they will start the morning lessons after the 4th of July. These lessons were full, which is really good. She attended the 6th grade pool party event, and the kids had a great time, and they loved the splash pad. You think middle schoolers are all grown up but they are still kids and they loved it. The pool manager is doing well, and they have good lifeguards and she thinks everyone is pretty happy with how things are going. They are going to have a ribbon cutting for the splash pad on June 29th at 4:00 p.m. and after the ribbon cutting, they will be thanking their donors through Grace United Methodist Church and afterwards families are invited to stay and spend the evening at the pool until 8:00 p.m. gratis which will hopefully encourage them to join up on another family membership or just come for a day of fun.

C. Laughlin asked if the pool memberships are up this year. T. Swinehart said she is not positive; she has been told that it has been pretty busy. She will have those numbers at the next meeting.

Public Art Subcommittee: No Report.

Recreation Department Subcommittee:

T. Swinehart said there were groups of them over a number of years working on the Recreation Director position and Council did approve an Ordinance to allow them to expand their Recreation Director position so the next step will be to speak with the Finance Department to make sure they have all the financial pieces accurate. They will then post and begin looking to see if they can find someone qualified and interested so they will hopefully start interviewing within the next month to six weeks after they get the postings out.

Rotary Park Subcommittee:

M. Musial reported two weekends ago, Rotary Club was at the park and planted all the flowerbeds and were able to get those done. The waterlines were repaired and finished this morning. The Ohio flag has been replaced; they needed some new rope up there because the rope that was put up was too short. The Rotary flag has been replaced and when the rope was replaced on that one, it was cut to the right length, but they didn't put the brass clips back up to hold the flag on it. He has some spare clips so he will put them up. They have a meeting next Wednesday and Marc will be there to discuss the status of the grant submissions, and he hopes they can get the plans finalized to present them here to the Parks Board.

C. Laughlin said she would like to give a shout out to Mike Rini and Peter Corogin and the others who climbed the water tower and replaced the light on top because that was quite a feat.

Pickleball Subcommittee:

C. Laughlin said things have been very busy at the pickleball courts. Christy has been holding clinics during the month of June. Unfortunately, they did not get to run that through the park as a park program, but they did have quite a bit of success doing it through social media. She asked Christy to give a report and there were five clinics held. The clinic attendance started out slowly and improved as the month went on, 36 players attended the clinics in June. She did do some private lessons that were requested after the clinics and started them before the clinics at 12:00 p.m. and both courts were open at the time, so it did not interfere with open play. She noted the nets were not at the correct height; one was 34 inches and 36 inches on the white sideline, and they are off about

a half to an inch in certain locations. M. Weisenberger said they would take a look at it. C. Laughlin said the recommendations for the future if they decide to continue or offer it as a program is to offer evening or weekend clinics for players who work because there were a lot of people who couldn't attend that working during the day. The positives Christy noted were the AED on the fence, two benches on the outside of the courts for players to sit on, the paddle holders for players waiting to play, the portable restrooms, the courts are in great condition with permanent nets, and the parking lot is large. C. Laughlin said she thinks it was a very positive experience for the community and 36 people have taken clinics due to social media. Hopefully next year they will have more opportunities, and it is a really positive initiative. T. Swinehart thanked Connie for helping to make it happen.

Erosion Control/Beach Retention:

M. Musial reported that he met with Marc Weisenberger at Showse Park last week. When he was first asked to look at this and they went to Showse, they noticed there was sand that was being pulled away and there was a lot of undercutting under the concrete structure. Mother nature put it all back so there is not a lot they could see there. They did look at the whole beachfront area and Mark Haynes joined them to look at it as well. On the pier, there are a number of blocks that have been lifted and pushed off the block rails that held it in place, so they are looking at getting some quotes to have those put back in place. Part of the problem with those being down under the water is they are not able to do their job of trapping sand on either side of it to help build up the beach. They also looked all along the beachfront where the flat blocks had been put up and some rip rock had been put up above portions of it but all of it and there is some serious erosion of the dirt being washed out above that so they are looking at getting some quotes to get some of that rip rock back in over the rest of those blocks. Further east, there are a lot of blocks that got picked up and moved and are all over the beach along that, so they are looking at trying to get those moved back to where they belong. It seems like most of that work is the type of work they don't need to go get permits for. It is more just bringing in an excavator to pick things up and put them back where they were in the Lake. Also, looking at the cliff line where the park is above and it drops down there is a section that has been washing away. They are looking at trying to extend the cement blocks to protect that whether it is doing the same thing with the blocks, rip rock and dirt or doing a little bit of shaving of some of that dirt, so it rolls down rather than just dropping off. Marc will get them some quotes and ideas on what that will really entail but they had a pretty good look. Marc Weisenberger and Mark Haynes went to Nakomis Beach because they had some issues there as well. M. Weisenberger said they will put some numbers together on some steps they can take there that are considered maintenance and work that can be done out of the water and could potentially be done without a lot of permitting and engineering and things like that. It would be putting things back and adding a little bit of additional structural stone in a couple of places. What he is proposing is things they can do initially with their own funding and then things they can do on a larger scale that would require some state and federal funding.

T. Swinehart asked who did the initial Showse Park shoreline work. M. Weisenberger answered that he thinks Mark Haynes did part of it initially and then Justin Miller did some of the repair work. M. Musial said they have not looked at Sherod Park yet, but they will be doing that in the next month or two as well. They have the same problem going on there so they should have a good idea of what is involved and the cost and what they can do maintenance wise verse something more extensive by the end of the summer.

OPEN TO THE AUDIENCE:

Katie Lalonde of 14014 Thompson Road stated she was there on behalf of Kiwanis for a couple of things. Amy Martin, President of Kiwanis wanted her to ask if on Monday, July 13th at Showse Park they can do a free craft for kids from 6:00pm to 8:00pm. They will provide all of the supplies, and the craft would be creating a t-shirt. She found out before the meeting there is a form they will need to fill out so she is asking for the permission and then they will fill out the form because this event would happen before the next meeting. T. Swinehart asked if that date was available. M. Weisenberger answered when she fills out the paperwork online it will let her know if the date and time are available. K. Lalonde said they would like to piggyback off the Sandlot Movie Night on July 31st. Kiwanis is going to be doing a family fun fair, and they will fill out the form for that as well. They will have free activities and free hot dogs, and they have reached out to a lot of the service groups such as the Girl Scouts to see if they wanted to set up a tent and do a craft. It has been blasted on Facebook, so she is here to ask for forgiveness for both events. The event will take place before the movie begins so it will be from 6:00pm to 9:00 pm. M. Wood asked if they were working with the group who is sponsoring the movie for that night and if they are aware this is happening. K. Lalonde said Jackie and Jeff have worked together a lot and they are aware. T. Swinehart said without the required form, they will need to approve the July 13th Kiwanis craft event at Showse Park from 6:00pm to 8:00pm.

T. Swinehart MOVED; C. Laughlin seconded to approve the use of Showse Park for the Kiwanis Craft Event on July 13, 2026, from 6:00pm to 8:00pm on condition that the required form is submitted and there is no conflict. Roll Call Vote 5 YEAS. **MOTION CARRIED**.

T. Swinehart said if they receive the form for the July 31st event, she will not need to come back and present, but they will vote at the July 21st meeting.

Karen Viterna of 4360 Edgewater Drive said she was there to talk about Night Lights Vermilion. She believes they heard at May's meeting that the Ohio Edison option for the lighting was not a real option. She has gone back and is looking along with a person who co-wrote the standards for Dark Sky International. He has graciously taken her under his wing to help her identify lights and things for Sherod Park and Nakomis Park and they know what they have to do for Main Street and Showse; she is just waiting on Tony Valeirus to give her the specs on the light for Showse. The lights at Showse are not owned by Ohio Edison, they are owned by the City, and the City pays directly for the power they consume. From what she can tell, they are the correct color temperature, but they are too bright and the amount of light that comes out is probably too high of wattage, so they probably want to put a dimmer on them and make them be dark sky compliant. The fixtures themselves she thinks they will be able to do, there is a glass dome underneath it that they can put the light in, but the light is recessed into the actual structure which is one of the things that dark sky needs. T. Swinehart asked if they will need private lamps to make dark sky compliance in Nakomis and in Sherod Park. K. Viterna answered yes, unless something really happens with Ohio Edison. They are talking about 16 fixtures, so it is not insurmountable and the savings and lower maintenance that these LEDs require will be fine. T. Swinehart asked when they passed their motion to approve all of this thinking it was going to be \$125 to shield the existing lights, they were incorrect. K. Viterna answered yes, they would end up with a situation like Elyria Street. T. Swinehart thanked Karen for digging all the information out and for being persistent. K. Viterna said they did an outreach event at Grace United Methodist Church, and she only had two people who have never heard of light pollution. Everyone else said they were so glad they were doing this, even people who live on the west side of Vermilion

were saying it was too bright and they couldn't see anything. The new Water Wood developer has already looked up night lights on their website and let her know they are already doing all that so they will not be an additional source of pollution. She hopes to provide more details in July and possibly give them something to propose on funding.

OLD BUSINESS: None.

NEW BUSINESS:

T. Swinehart MOVED; J. Beatty seconded to accept the \$150,000 grant awarded from the 136th General Assembly Capital Budget Community Projects Fund for the Showse Park Revitalization Phase 3 Sports Complex and Parking Lots. Roll Call Vote 5 YEAS. MOTION CARRIED.

J. Beatty MOVED; S. Kuhn seconded to allocate \$75,000 from Capital Fund 204 to complete the Showse Park Phase 3 Sports Complex and Parking Lot. Discussion: T. Swinehart said the Finance Committee spoke about this before their meeting and in the 204 Capital Levy Fund they have the required dollars thanks to the grant writing and donations. Roll Call Vote 5 YEAS. MOTION CARRIED.

M. Musial MOVED; C. Laughlin seconded to go out to bid for the Showse Park Sports Complex and Parking Lot. Discussion: T. Swinehart asked if they will get multiple bids when they do this. M. Weisenberger answered yes, they will put it out to bid and see how many companies bid on it, but he thinks with the contacts they have already made getting estimates, they are aware of it so he thinks they will get a number of bids. T. Swinehart asked when he thought the project might begin if everything went as they hoped. M. Weisenberger answered that it could be a potential fall project. Roll Call Vote 5 YEAS. MOTION CARRIED.

C. Laughlin MOVED; T. Swinehart seconded to allocate \$50,000 from Capital Fund 204 to complete the pickleball courts at West Breeze Park. Roll Call Vote 5 YEAS. MOTION CARRIED.

M. Musial MOVED; S. Kuhn seconded to approve the grant proposal writing for the Epic EVB Grant for up to \$100,000 for the Sherod Park Paving Project for the upper north parking lot. Roll Call Vote 5 YEAS. MOTION CARRIED.
